REGULAR MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL (2) JULY 19, 2007

Mayor Wilson opened the Regular Meeting of City Council at 5:30 PM.

Call to Order

Councilmember Bradley rendered the invocation and Mayor Wilson led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Invocation and Pledge

Mayor Wilson asked that all non-emergency electronic devices and cell phones be turned off during the Council Meeting.

Mayor Wilson recognized and welcomed Boy Scouts representing Troops 396, 333, 300 and 360.

Mayor Wilson opened the Public Comment Section at 5:37 PM.

Public Comments

Mayor Wilson recognized Mrs. Shirley Carter who addressed City Council concerning sidewalk signs and handicapped access. She said the merchants on Front Street are not happy because there is not a consistency between what Council wants and what they have to comply to. She asked Council to take some time and consider where the signs are to be placed, give the merchants an accurate place and leave them there. Mrs. Carter said she was required by Building and Planning to have a handicapped accessible restroom in her building. She met the deadline but is angry because everybody is not doing this: for example the Chamber of Commerce. An article in the newspaper stated a Front Street merchant was fined \$1,000 a day for not having a handicapped accessible restroom. Mayor Wilson spoke up and said there will be a retraction in the paper...that is erroneous. Mrs. Carter reiterated her concern that everyone should be in compliance.

Mayor Wilson recognized Mr. Ward Walter. Mr. Walter communicated his concerns regarding his contract (Jolly Rover) with the City. He assumed the only changes were the amount of money and the length of the contract. In previous contracts he was able to have signage, ice box, etc. but is not allowed in the contract signed three years ago...just assumed it was included. He said the ARB has informed him "all of his stuff has to go" but stated the sign and ice box are absolutely necessary to operate his business. Mayor Wilson asked Mr. Thomas to talk with Mr. Walter about the matter.

Mayor Wilson recognized Sam and Pam Miller and several other residents of Willowbank who addressed City Council concerning speed reduction. Mrs. Miller said the speed limit is not posted on Palmetto Street; it is posted on Wood Street and Willowbank Road.

Traffic cuts through Willowbank to avoid a traffic light and speeds down the road: 25 MPH is too fast for the neighborhood where trees line the narrow streets and people park on the side of the roads. They are requesting the speed limit be reduced to 15 MPH and enforced. Mr. Thomas stated this is a state maintained road. The Police Department can pass this request along to DOT. Mrs. Miller said she lives at 1129 Palmetto Street and the police can park in their yard any time.

The Public Comment section was closed at 5:50 PM.

Mayor Wilson shared with Council a flag of the United States of American that was received today from 1LT William Jonathan Tisdale, a former Police Officer with the City of Georgetown. He read, "This is to certify that this flag of the United States of America was flown in the face of the enemy over Camp Phoenix, Afghanistan by the Officer, NCOs and Soldiers B Troop, 202d Cavalry South Carolina Army National Guard during OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM on the 27th day of June, in the Year of Our Lord, Two Thousand Seven.

Major Johnnie Deas introduced three new employees hired in June. Ms. Sternique Geathers, office assistant for the front desk, Police Officer II Jeffery Slaybaugh and Police Officer III Clint Vickery.

Major Deas present a commendation to Officer Jarrod Jordan for exemplary performance. While conducting routine patrol, on June 22, 2007, he observed a known suspect with a suspended drivers license operating a vehicle within the city limits. Based on his training and knowledge, Officer Jordan immediately conducted a traffic stop on the suspect. Based on the traffic stop, the suspect was arrested for a suspended drivers license. A search of the vehicle disclosed narcotics, a firearm and the seizure of \$57,254.00 in US currency which is being held as part of an on going narcotics investigation. The suspect was subsequently charged with possession of narcotics more than first offense and a felon in possession of a firearm. Georgetown is clearly a safer city as a direct result of Officer Jordan's service to its citizens, which reflects positively upon him and the Georgetown Police Department.

Mrs. Cindi Howard informed Council the safety incentive program was re-implemented this year. She announced the Water Department was the Second Quarter Departmental Safety Award winner and presented Mr. Lane Mixon with the trophy.

Mr. Keith Wilson introduced Mr. Ken Simmons of Kenneth B. Simmons Associates, LLC. Before presenting the actual Master Plan to Council, Mr. Simmons pointed out several significant elements why Morgan Park is such a dynamic location. It is at the peninsular between the Bay and Sampit River and was very strategic years ago as a fort to secure the safety of the community. As the town developed the property evolved from a fortress into an active recreation site. In working with the community he evaluated and analyzed not only Morgan Park but the entire environment...how it relates to the community. There are two very significant site characteristics that should have major effects on the redevelopment of Morgan Park. First is the location of Fort Winyaw. As shown on the archaeological report and on the existing conditions map, the fort was located where the driveway to the parking lot meets the paved public road. Secondly is the storm surge/flood elevation. Based on signage in this immediate area and the elevation of new residents around East Bay Park, predicted flood water could reach nine feet above ground level at the Park. If a permanent structure is built on the existing Morgan Park it would have to be built so that the floor elevation would be at least nine to ten feet above ground. In addition, if a building were built on the small peninsular or islands of the current Morgan Park, it would be on top of the historic fort or any underground utilities to the structure. This would significantly degrade the importance of this historical site. Mr. Simmons presented his proposed Morgan Park Master Plan and stated this would be long term development plan. The Task Force Committee felt that a strong pedestrian connection should continue from the existing harborwalk, through the boating/fishing village, the neighborhoods, a portion of East Bay Park to Morgan Park continuing through East Bay Park on a proposed future boardwalk crossing the marsh to the general area of the Coast Guard Station/marina and eventually tie into the 'East Coast Greenway.' The benefits of this would be enormous.

Mayor Wilson asked all the Boys Scouts to come forward and he presented each one with a City of Georgetown lapel pin.

Mayor Wilson asked for Council's approval to move item 15C up on their agenda. There was no objection. Mrs. Elizabeth Krauss, Executive Director for Georgetown County Board of Disabilities and Special Needs, requested approval of recycling service agreement between the City of Georgetown and DSN utilizing new man-hour rates. She stated they provide liability and workers compensation insurance on their individuals.

Councilmember Scoville recused himself because he provides professional services for the Georgetown County Board of Disabilities and Special Needs.

COUNCILMEMBER BRADLEY MOVED TO APPROVE RECYCLING SERVICE AGREEMENT WITH GEORGETOWN COUNTY BOARD OF DISABILITIES AND SPECIAL NEEDS, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER WAYNE. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mr. Bradley asked if money is being made off of the recycling. Mrs. Krauss said they do not collect any money from the county; the supervisor and his crew deliver the recyclable items where they are separated by prisoner laborers. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **MAYOR WILSON AND COUNCILMEMBERS BRADLEY, SAWYER, SMALLS AND WAYNE VOTED IN FAVOR. COUNCILMEMBER SCOVILLE WAS RECUSED. THE MOTION WAS CARRIED 5-0-1.**

Mrs. Sabrina Morris presented an ordinance for second reading to amend the Zoning Ordinance to remove government offices from the R-4 District.

COUNCILMEMBER SMALLS MOVED TO APPROVE SECOND READING TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE, ARTICLE VII, SECTION 703, SUBSECTION 703.210 TO REMOVE GOVERNMENT OFFICES FROM THE R-4 DISTRICT, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SAWYER. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION WAS UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**

Mrs. Morris presented an ordinance for first reading to rezone three parcels totaling approximately .85 acres owned by C2G2, LLC located on Barr Street and Elizabeth Street from Low Density Residential to General Commercial.

COUNCILMEMBER SAWYER MOVED TO DENY REQUEST TO REZONE THREE PARCELS TOTALING APPROXIMATELY .85 ACRES OWNED BY C2G2, LLC LOCATED ON BARR STREET AND ELIZABETH STREET FROM LOW DENSITY RESIDENTIAL TO GENERAL COMMERCIAL, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER WAYNE. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION WAS UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**

Mrs. Morris presented an ordinance for first reading to amend the City of Georgetown Zoning Ordinance for creation of Article XVII: the Community Appearance Board and adopt guidelines for said Board.

COUNCILMEMBER BRADLEY MOVED TO APPROVE FIRST READING ON AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CITY OF GEORGETOWN ZONING ORDINANCE FOR CREATION OF ARTICLE XVII: THE COMMUNITY APPEARANCE BOARD AND ADOPT GUIDELINES FOR SAID BOARD, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SAWYER. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mr. Bradley asked if it would be possible to combine the ARB and Planning Commission to serve as the CAB. Mrs. Morris said individuals can only serve on one board. Mr. Scoville asked how many permits have been issued that would come under the overlay district since it has been enacted. She said there has been one new construction and three renovations. They have all met the guidelines without any controversy. The new construction was not familiar with the guidelines, staff submitted the changes and they were met. Mr. Sawyer asked if this would pertain to commercial businesses and Mrs. Morris answered it will not pertain to residential; it is commercial additions, renovations, new construction and industrial. Mrs. Wayne said she wanted members of the CAB to live in the City limits. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION WAS UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**

Mayor Wilson recognized Councilmember Bradley who wanted to discuss building codes, charges and requirements.

Mr. Bradley said he had a very productive discussion with Mr. Thomas and Mrs. Morris which was very rewarding. He asked for permission to summarize a prepared statement to be submitted into the record. Mayor Wilson approved.

Mrs. Morris and Building and Planning staff compliments and accolades to you for the job you did and are doing. However, it is inevitable and always that an elected official will be caught between a rock and a hard place. The rock is the public and the hard place is the system of government.

We the elected officials have an arduous task. That task is to enact ordinances, laws, rules, policies and procedures that would be deemed best, ideal and proper by and for the rock and that hard place. Ordinances are a set of laws that implies and or expresses.

Ordinances are strictly applied and or leniently executed. This caused me to question Building and Planning enforcement and application of the International Building Codes and the utilization thereof. Based upon my understanding and research the codes were prior to transitions leniently applied but today it is being strictly enforced. The codification of the International Building Codes did not include areas like Georgetown. Cases in point, the industrial states were the premise for the codes and also its precursor. Though Georgetown was a factory town, the overall area was an agrarian society. There was no Empire State Building, Twin Towers or Taj Mah Hall type built in Georgetown. It is my understanding that strict adherence to the code is not a mandate especially when there exist a viable alternative but that alternative must be constant and neither ambiguous not arbitrary.

Georgetown property owners doing it themselves is common and too, it serves to enhance the community. Some do it because they can and others because it is cost effective to do it themselves. So is it necessary to hire an architect before widening one door.

If a well experienced builder and or contractor is mandated or compelled by code to have an architect design to build, I find that illogical, unfair and also it would encumber or unduly burden the builder or contractor.

Why should the property owner or builder hire an engineer when the city has a building inspector?

Regarding the building codes violation fines, it is very true that some persons are and shall violate the codes and they should be punished for that but in questioning the fines sum total levied, does the city have a mathematical means derivative for that. Thus, there must be some assurance that those fines were not derived by either whim or impulse.

Consequently, we must be ever mindful and strive to diligently adhere to our American values when using the system of government and those values are as follows: Life, liberty, Property, Community, Equality and The Pursuit of Happiness.

Councilmember Wayne said she has an item to bring up as new business for this department, if Council will allow. A request for a moratorium on all sign enforcement until the Council workshop on the sign ordinance can be held, discussed and voted on. Mayor Wilson said he has been told moratoriums are illegal. Discussion among Council followed. Councilmember Bradley asked if those who execute the sign ordinance could legally be lax with the execution of the law. Mrs. Crosby said she has not heard of moratoriums being illegal and is researching that right now. She stated there is a problem when we enforce one part and don't enforce another; that is selective enforcement. She advised against using 'moratorium' and said as long as it is done uniformly across the board and indicates a particular section is not going to be enforced until such a meeting is held. Councilmember Scoville said Building and Planning has written a letter to the merchants informing them the ordinance will not be enforced until August 23rd. Mrs. Morris said right now her department is working with new signs that need a permit or have applied and this is being done for the entire City. She stated the sign ordinance has been rewritten and a workshop will be scheduled to review the changes.

Mrs. Miller requested approval of a FY 07/08 budget amendment to the Water Utility Fund, repairs and maintenance service, in the amount of \$26,400. She said this was a computer glitch, when the budget was rolled from first reading to second reading this amount was zeroed out. New World has been contacted about this problem.

COUNCILMEMBER BRADLEY MOVED TO APPROVE 2007/2008 BUDGET AMENDMENT TO THE WATER UTILITY FUND, REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE SERVICE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$26,400, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SCOVILLE. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION WAS UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**

Mr. Alan Loveless presented for approval an updated Emergency Mutual Aid Assistance Compact with the South Carolina Association of Municipal Power System. The existing agreement is over 20 years old and FEMA has suggested that it be updated to avoid the possibility of delays in reimbursements after an emergency.

COUNCILMEMBER BRADLEY MOVED TO APPROVE THE UPDATED EMERGENCY MUTUAL AID ASSISTANCE COMPACT WITH THE SOUTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF MUNICIPAL POWER SYSTEM, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER WAYNE.

Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION WAS UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**

Mr. Lane Mixon presented a recommendation to eliminate parallel parking on Fraser Street, 380 feet north and south of the Front and Fraser Streets intersection. In July 2006 the City applied for \$250,000 in GSATS funding to improve this intersection. The project would include left turn lanes in both directions on US 17, new signals and improvements to the railroad crossing. Recently, GSATS did approve funding for the project; however, the parallel parking on Fraser Street must be eliminated. After reviewing the area on Fraser Street it is Mr. Mixon's opinion the 380 feet north be extended to Highmarket Street. Basically there would be no parallel parking on Fraser Street between Highmarket and Winyah Streets. Mayor Wilson asked Mr. Mixon if he has talked with the merchants. Mr. Mixon said he has not talked with the merchants. Mayor Wilson said this should be put on hold until they have all been contacted. Councilmember Wayne said all the merchants that would be affected have parking beside their business.

COUNCILMEMBER BRADLEY MOVED TO TABLE THE RECOMMENDATION TO ELIMINATE PARALLEL PARKING ON FRASER STREET UNTIL NEXT MONTH, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SAWYER. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**

Mr. Mixon told Council staff has talked with DOT and received confirmation from the Federal Highway Commission they will not provide the funding for the US Highway 17 drainage project if we decide to award the contract to the low bidder at a reduced scope. There are two options; reduce the scope and re-advertise for bids with the available funding or stay with the project design as is and continue to pursue the additional funding. Councilmember Wayne wants to "forget the whole thing with the drainage project." Mayor Wilson wants to pursue funding and Councilmember Bradley agreed. Councilmember Scoville said he is frustrated as Mrs. Wayne; however, feels this is a major health and safety issue and wants to go after the funding and really make an effort. If this involves a trip to Washington, this is what we need to do, as well as hammering away in Columbia. Mayor Wilson instructed Mr. Thomas to put this on the fast track.

**Update on US 17
Drainage Project**

Mr. Mixon said the Town of Andrews has offered to sell the City of Georgetown 590,000 gallons per day of their existing wastewater plant capacity. The District would purchase the remaining 410,000 gallons per day. The final purchase price would be determined on the date of the sale. As of May 2007, Andrews owes the City over \$326,000 in past due payments. The value of the capacity is calculated to be \$496,625.40. The City would propose to hold the balance, \$170,044.49, as a credit for future monthly payments. Mr. Mixon stated the City does need the extra capacity to expand its service area to new customers, we will remain the majority owner at the Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant. Mr. Mixon asked Council if they were interested in pursuing this matter. Mr. Thomas said Mr. Windham sent an updated proposed agreement which basically outlines how the difference would be held and spent. Andrews is still reviewing the capacity agreement with the City and the District. Mr. Thomas has asked the City Attorney to review the proposed agreement, contact the attorneys for both Andrews and the District and look at any possible effect on the overall partnership agreement. He said this is the right thing to do to buy the capacity and wants to be certain Council is still on board to follow through.

Discuss Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant Capacity Purchase and Reallocation Proposal

Mr. Thomas presented a proposed renewal agreement with Saint Frances Animal Center for a two year period in the amount of \$53,000 annually, assuming funds are appropriated in the subsequent fiscal year.

COUNCILMEMBER BRADLEY MOVED TO APPROVE RENEWAL AGREEMENT WITH SAINT FRANCES ANIMAL CENTER FOR A TWO YEAR PERIOD ASSUMING FUNDS ARE APPROPRIATED IN THE SUBSEQUENT FISCAL YEAR, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER WAYNE. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**

Approve Agreement with Saint Frances Animal Center

Mr. Thomas introduced an ordinance for first reading authorizing conveyance of the 'old city dog pound' building/facility located at 125 North Ridge Street to the Saint Frances Animal Center of Georgetown, South Carolina, after which he recognized City Attorney, Mrs. Elise Crosby. After researching the title, Mrs. Crosby suggested Council does not need to give first reading because the City does not own the property. We have held a lease hold interest on 0.75 acres since 1991 with IP that terminates at the end of 2011. The dog pound is located on what has been International Paper land. On December 20, 2006 International Paper conveyed 0.75

acres by quit claim deed to the Saint Frances Humane Society. Because of the conveyance, the lease with the City is virtually terminated. At present the City has a lease hold interest on part of what Saint Frances owns, the dog pound property, through 2011 for \$1 a year. Mrs. Crosby's recommendation is to reach an agreement with them as to whether we are going to continue to lease or terminate the lease. According to Mrs. Crosby, although the lease was never recorded it is legal.

COUNCILMEMBER SCOVILLE MOVED TO TERMINATE THE LEASE HOLD INTEREST WITH SAINT FRANCES ANIMAL CENTER, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER BRADLEY. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION WAS UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**

Terminate Lease Hold Interest with Saint Frances Animal Center

Mr. Thomas presented an amendment to Article I, Section 16-1, Alcoholic Liquor on public property; consumption prohibited, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Georgetown, that would give the flexibility for events on public property that involve alcohol. He said this has been discussed with the Special Events Committee.

COUNCILMEMBER BRADLEY MOVED TO GIVE FIRST READING TO AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE I, SECTION 16-1, ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR ON PUBLIC PROPERTY; CONSUMPTION PROHIBITED, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GEORGETOWN, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SAWYER. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion.

1st Reading – Alcohol on Public Property

COUNCILMEMBER SCOVILLE MOVED TO AMEND THE MOTION TO CHANGE THE WORD 'PROPOSED' TO 'PERMITTED', SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SAWYER.

Councilmember Scoville asked that staff consider clarifying the wording addressing 'in the presence of passengers while in any passenger vehicle.' He said there is an ordinance that says you can't drink on a public street and that it is prim fascia evidence that you are in possession of an open container of some type and asked if this provision has the effect of repealing that section? Mrs. Crosby said it would not conflict; however, she will need to research if there is another section that criminalizes open container possession. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION WAS UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**

Mr. Thomas asked for Council's consideration to allow staff to draft a letter regarding their position and/or comments to the S. C. State Housing Finance and Development Authority using input from Council, pertaining to Waterford Village and Pin Oak Apartments. Mayor Wilson stated Council has expressed their opinion on the matter and instructed Mr. Thomas to draft a letter including information submitted by the public and City Council's reaffirmation not to support either development.

Letter to State Housing Finance & Development Authority

Councilmember Sawyer asked for a date for a workshop to discuss the vehicle inventory information and terminating pick up of household debris. Mr. Thomas said this could certainly be placed on the agenda for the fall retreat. Mr. Sawyer said that would be fine with him if it is agreeable with the other members.

Item for Retreat

Mr. Thomas proposed adding a general City Administrator report to the agendas for regular Council meetings. City Council approved the idea.

COUNCILMEMBER SAWYER MOVED TO APPROVE MINUTES OF PUBLIC HEARINGS DATED JUNE 21, 2007 AND JUNE 28, 2007, REGULAR MEETING DATED JUNE 21, 2007 AND SPECIAL MEETING DATED JUNE 28, 2007, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER BRADLEY. Mayor Wilson asked for discussion. Mayor Wilson called for the question. **THE MOTION WAS UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED 6-0.**
